LOVE GOD LOVE OTHERS

A VISION FOR THE PORT CHARLOTTE SDA CHURCH BY BEN SHURTLIFF, SENIOR PASTOR This article is aimed at introducing what I believe should be the mission statement of our church. However, I would like to introduce those core values for our church borrowing a concept from one of my favorite books on the debate between creation versus evolution. It is written by Michael Behe entitled Darwin's Black Box. In it, Behe introduces the term "irreducible complexity." The following is the definition he provides: "I defined an irreducibly complex system as: a single system which is necessarily composed of several wellmatched, interacting parts that contribute to the basic function, and where the removal of any one of the parts causes the system to

effectively cease

functioning."

One example of this, that you are presently using in reading this article, is the human eye. The cornea, iris, lens, pupil, vitreous, optical nerve, and more are all necessary for eyesight to occur. If you take out one or more of these items, there is either no vision or virtually no vision. Michael Behe's overall point is that vision is not evolutionary in nature. All the pieces and parts of the eye must be present and properly arranged or vision cannot occur. There can be no millions of years of trial and error to develop eyesight. Unless the necessary portions are

present and fully developed, there is no eyesight. If you haven't yet read his book, *Darwin's Black Box*, I highly encourage you to do so.

Let's transition to thinking about this concept of irreducible complexity in terms of the church. How would you describe a church's core values or mission statement in the most irreducibly complex way possible? For me, I think it comes down to "love God, love others." Love God first, and then because of your love for God, love all others with His help. A church that aims to love God and love others will be a church that loves to study God's word and delights to follows it. A church that aims to "love God, love others" will be a church that shows it's love of God by loving every tribe, nation, tongue, and people at every age and stage and from whatever walk of life. Ephesians

describes this very process. At the heart of Paul's message in Ephesians 4:15, 16 he states:

"Instead, speaking the truth in love, we will grow to become in every respect the mature body of him who is the head, that is, Christ. From him the whole body, joined and held together by every supporting ligament, grows and builds itself up in love, as each part does its work."

Sounds like "love God, love others" to me.

God is truly working in us to do His good pleasure. When we love God and put Him first, we become His hands and feet to serve and by doing so, show His love to others. This may occur in a thousand different ways, but all of them could be summed up by "love God, love others". In my mind, as your friend and pastor this is the irreducibly

complex vision statement for God's church. If we say we have love for God, but don't demonstrate that love by caring for others, we are not the church as defined by scripture. However, if we as a church family increase in our love for God, and therefore our love of others increases, we will surely be found doing what we are here to do before Jesus comes again. I invite you to consider this mission statement for our church family. "Love God, love others" has a nice simple yet profound ring to it!






Pastor Gavin and Hannah Moraga were married on March 10 in the Miami area.

Community Service Center: Update on Progress

The story of our community service center began many years ago as a dream, cherished by several of our church members, to have a place open to the community where people with needs could come for love and care. Over time and through countless volunteer hours, thousands of pieces of clothing, food items, furniture and knick-knacks found their way into neighborhood homes. And every month the center was a source of help for many electric and water bills.

Leadership changed hands several times and various programs and policies were put into place over the decades, but the primary focus of caring and sharing remained the same. Then the wind event of 2021 came, followed by Hurricane Ian in 2022. Remodeling had already begun in response to leadership's then-latest vision for the center, but when hurricane forces combined with COVID-19 pandemic mandates, the

center's mission was forced into a long pause. For the first time in more than 40 years the center was closed.

Restoration efforts began for the school and the church, but insurance did not cover the small building in the middle of the campus. Its roof was replaced and the outside was repainted with church funding, giving a promising look to passers-by, but inside, the walls, floors and ceilings told a different story. It was now professionally estimated to cost us at least \$93,000 to complete the planned remodeling as well as to

make the necessary restoration repairs.

And then the miracles of volunteered love and skilled compassion began to happen. Brian Brunderman continued to offer his time and certification to function as our general contractor, using the plans that had been supervised and submitted to the county by Ed Dancek and the design team. Joe Francis and **Resty Antonio removed** walls and truckloads of unwanted items. Phillis and Duane Morauske moved, organized, cleaned, and moved and organized again. They also

spent hours restoring the outside sign to a betterthan-ever state! Wayne Shinn repaired the ceilings and walls, getting them ready for painting. And then every wall was beautifully painted by Sokol Lekic and his team. Ric Germ took care of the outside landscaping with new plants and mulch. Victor Baz remodeled both restrooms and spray painted the entrance railings, as well as the safety posts.






